1. Important Information Regarding this Application

This is the GPSO Research Award application for Spring 2012.

To be eligible for this award:

1. You must be a full-time graduate or professional student at Indiana University Bloomington. You must be enrolled in 8 or more credit hours, a Student Academic Appointee enrolled in 6 or more credit hours, or enrolled in dissertation hours (e.g. G901).
2. Your research must take place between August 1, 2012 and July 31, 2013.
3. You must not be a member of the GPSO Executive Committee, employee of the GPSO, or an active member of the GPSO Awards Committee reviewing applications for this award.

Once you begin this application you may not be able to save and come back to make changes. A pdf preview of the application is available at the GPSO website at <http://www.iu.edu/~gpso/Research-Grants.php>. Please have the following ready before you begin this application:

1. A brief summary of your research (300 words)
2. An explanation of why your research is relevant
3. A detailed budget of your research expenses
4. A detailed timeline of your research project

Completed applications are due on March 11, 2012. Late applications will not be accepted.

GPSO Research Awards are awarded as university fellowships so you should be aware of your total financial aid need and the amount of financial aid you have already received. If you have already reached your financial aid maximum for the current semester, you may be ineligible for this award. If you are selected as a winner for this award:

1. You will be asked to submit receipts or other evidence of your activities for our records.






