## NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK AT IU

The National Library Week Committee of the Indiana University Librarians' Association is sponsoring several activities to celebrate National Library Week (April 8-14, 1973). The National Library Week Program is sponsored by the National Book Committee in cooperation with the American Library Association. It is observed in all fifty states, by many national organizations, and by both public and academic libraries. Launched in 1956, the "week" was intended to promote interest in libraries and reading on a nationwide scale. Without losing this primary purpose, National Library Week participants have attempted to focus attention on library services and development, effective use of libraries, and public support for libraries of all kinds. The themes for this year are "Get Ahead...Read" and "Widen Your World...Read".

The local Indiana University National Library Week program, chaired by Lillian Riggs, places emphasis on explaining the functions of public and academic libraries in Indiana, how they complement each other in serving the public, and how they use technology to share resources. The program will also include two fund-raising activities for scholarships: the Arts and Crafts Sale and the Book Sale.

The public is cordially invited to participate in the following activities: Arts and Crafts Sale, Monday April 9, IU Undergraduate Library Lounge, 10:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. This event will provide a source of funds for the Indiana University Librarians' Association Scholarship Fund and will give area craftsmen and women an opportunity to display their work. Both university and community-organized crafts centers and individual artists have been invited to consign examples of their work.

TV Program, Monday, April 9, WTTV Channel 4, 11:00 A.M.-11:30 A.M. Marcelle Foote, Director of the Indiana State Library, and Carl W. Jackson, Dean of the Indiana University Libraries, will appear on the Betsy Goodspeed television show. Viewers will have an opportunity to learn how public and academic libraries complement each other in serving the community and why both types of institutions are necessary, how Indiana libraries cooperate in order to provide service,

and what plans exist for future cooperation. The discussion will include a study in which the Indiana State Library and Indiana University Libraries are currently participating.

National Library Week Concert, Monday April 9, Bloomington Symphony Orchestra, Main Library North Entrance, 7:30 P.M. Members of the Bloomington Symphony have graciously agreed to perform a varied selection of chamber music, in an approximately 45 minute concert. There will be no admission charge.

"The Heroin Problem and the Golden Triangle," Talk by Prof. Alfred R. Lindesmith, Undergraduate Library Lounge, 7:30-8:30 P.M. Prof. Lindesmith is the author of the following publications: Opiate Addiction, 1947; (with others) Anomie and Deviant Behavior, 1964; (with Dr. A. Strauss) Social Psychology, 1949; The Addict and the Law, 1965. He is, in addition, the editor or co-editor of The Sutherland Papers, 1956; Drug Addiction: Crime or Disease, 1961; Addiction and Opiates, 1962. The public is welcome and coffee will be served.

The traditional 4th annual book sale will be held at the Undergraduate Library Lounge from 1:00 P.M. Thursday, April 12, to 2:00 A.M. Friday, and again from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Friday, April 13. #### PROMOTION AND TENURE PROCEDURES

Roger Buck, Associate Dean of Faculties, spoke to InULA March 21 on "The Process of Evaluation for Promotion and Tenure among Teaching Faculty."

Dean Buck first outlined tenure procedures followed in Bloomington. The initial appointment usually covers three years. Also after two years of service a full year's notice is required to terminate someone. In the Fall of the sixth or decision year, a dossier is prepared by the department or school concerned. It may include a record of opinions of tenured faculty; statements from the chairman, dean, and administrators; internal evaluations by other colleagues; external evaluations by scholars of other institutions; an assessment of teaching ability by students and faculty; and a statement of future plans by the applicant.

The tenure committee then reviews these materials. The chancellor appoints observers from other schools to the committee. There is no all-campus tenure committee. Dean Buck reported that it is rare for a dean to strongly diverge from his committee.

The procedures for promotion in rank are similar to those for tenure. A dossier is prepared for every recommendation; and the criteria are teaching, scholarship, and service. The general rule is that the recommendation for promotion is made by the majority of the

department at or above the considered rank. There are also two non-standard mechanisms possible to initiate the promotions review as listed by Dean Buck--self-nomination or nomination by a colleague from the department. The "passover process" is a procedure followed by the dean of faculties in reviewing those who have been in any one rank a long time--instructors, after three years; assistant professors, after five years; and associate professors, after seven years.

In comparing the processes for promotion and tenure Dean Buck stressed that promotion involves a retrospective view of what the candidate has achieved, an evaluation of his individual career. On the other hand tenure procedures comprise a forecast, a prospective decision of the applicant's worth to his unit.

Dean Buck also accepted questions from the audience about quotas in either tenure or rank appointments. He noted that it is a "rule of thumb" to prefer no more than three years credit toward tenure in any initial appointment. The subjects of the Affirmative Action committee and current economic effects on promotion and tenure decisions were also discussed.
